

We recently lost a genuine Great Hamptonian, Tony Cavan. The well-known local baker had shops in Hampton, Hampton Hill and, more recently, Teddington. But his major local achievement must surely be his determination to achieve the right market price for the St Clare's garden centre site, now the large Sainsbury's supermarket in Uxbridge Road.

The original landowners were prepared to accept only £3 million, but in 1989, Tony, along with Richmond Council, the Hampton Hill Association and the Hampton Residents' Association (the Society's previous title), pressed successfully in the High Court for the more realistic £21.6 million.

Although Tony had retired from the family business set up by his father back in 1929, he remained very active with Companion Cycling in Bushy Park, volunteer driving for the Greenwood Centre in Hampton Hill, acting as a trustee for the latter charity and was very involved in the activities of St Mary's church. *Continued on back page...*

Could Hampton Square look like this? Ideas, please



At last we've some idea of what Hampton Square in front of "little" Sainsbury's could look like. Until the original White House is demolished it will be hard to visualise what Richmond Council's proposed Uplift programme for the area will involve. Now with the artist's impression – suggested by our Society – reproduced here, local residents can examine it and suggest ideas of their own.

This scene was reproduced on posters in the precinct in early February. Taking a theme of oval shapes in designs of sloping green areas and planted beds edged in York stone, there will be raised places for seating along them. In addition, there will be timber benches for people to sit and enjoy the newly-landscaped outdoor space – an ideal place to rest for weary shoppers or parents of small children.

Two splendid play fountains, similar to the one in Kingston's Market Square, are planned for a site close to the entrance from the main car-park. Activated by scanner, once someone steps near them up comes a jet of water. The kids'll love it, and so will the Court Jester pub's customers from their ringside seats facing into the square!

The children's playground itself will be on a grassed area on the opposite side. Featuring a timber stile, timber tractor and even timber sheep, none of them are high enough to present fears of serious hazard to youngsters.

With 2,190 square metres of space, a permanent location for a Christmas tree, cycle racks and fresh lighting are all envisaged for the new square as well as a regular monthly market. Hampton's secondary schools have all shown interest in staging open-air entertainments there, too.

That's all the information available to us at the time of going to press. We know deciduous trees are planned, as shown in this picture, and all the businesses and organisations will remain as at present. Adam Mardell, Richmond Council's Uplift programme manager, says he's already received over 100 responses from residents, most of them favourable. But he'd like more, especially if they're constructive. After all, we're the ones who'll have to live with it. So email him at adam.mardell@richmond.gov.uk. MW



Another bumper Christmas parade

Recession or no recession, Hampton's Christmas parade and celebrations, organised by our local Village Traders Association last December, still raised £1,300 for local good causes. The progress of Santa's sleigh along Station and Ashley roads must have been seen by over a thousand people, making the most of the dark late afternoon for the lighting-up ceremony of Christmas trees above the shops.



On this occasion the Traders asked the police to close the sleigh route to traffic, enabling a free flow of pedestrians among the many stalls set up on the pavements. Judged to be a wise move, according to HVTA's Michael Badger. "Santa's route over the railway bridge meant Hampton felt more like one village, not one divided by railway tracks."

It also meant more safety for small children coming to see Santa in his sleigh (courtesy Teddington and Hampton Rotary Club), or else to stuff themselves with free popcorn and candyfloss!

Steve Parker of the Cheese and Wine Shop reckoned he'd poured out 74 litres of mulled wine to thirsty revellers during the three-hour event. "Having the roads closed really helped us", he said. "It was much safer for children, too".



Other beneficiaries included the Sweet Café in Wensleydale Road, who saw their customer footfall double in the week following the parade and Shaun's Quality Meats in Station Road. Shaun generously donated £400 to charity, most of it dropped into his donation boxes by customers satiated with his sausages on sticks and turkey-and-cranberry rolls topped with sausages.

What with all this meat, wine, sweets, chestnuts (at Chino's) and samosas (at Ruchi among others) I think next year's parade will see a crowd of hungry lunchers, too! MW

Denmead's neighbours win latest round

The latest round of proposals to extend Denmead School in Gloucester Road has been narrowly won by the Denmead Neighbours Association. At a Richmond Council planning meeting in January five out of nine councillors rejected the school's current development plans for new buildings to accommodate 176 pupils compared with the existing 144.

Increased traffic is the big issue. According to the Association website www.denmead-neighbours.org more pupils will mean more traffic. Gloucester Road residents in particular already suffer heavy school traffic at both ends of the school day.

To help alleviate the current congestion, the school has been encouraging pupils to arrive via Carlisle Park's Wensleydale Road entrance. Boys arriving by Hampton School coach are dropped off at the park gate where they are met by a staff-member and walked across the park to school.

But clearly this hasn't been enough to convince the Council's planners. **MW**

Tony Cavan will also be remembered for the planting of trees and 4,000 daffodil bulbs and crocus corms on the triangle at the junction of Wensleydale and Gloucester roads in 1989. He also remained very active with Companion Cycling in Bushy Park.

He also co-founded Hampton Hill Traders Association and had wider interests in the Association of Master Bakers, many of which have been recorded elsewhere. But he was a true son of the locality, going to school at Denmead, then Hampton Grammar School, as it was then. He later ran a scout group at Denmead, sat on the school's board and became chairman of governors there.

But perhaps what many local residents will remember that, in 1989, Tony planted trees and 4,000 daffodil bulbs and crocus corms on the triangle at the junction of Wensleydale and Gloucester roads. That was to celebrate the sixtieth anniversary of the family business.

Tony was 77 when he died of leukaemia in January, leaving his wife Penny, sons David and Jonathan and his daughter Sarah, who now runs the business along with her husband Jeff.
