More Members More Influence

With 2016 having been a most successful year for new members to the Society, we think it's time to highlight the importance we attach to their opinions.

Whether it's the proposed Kempton Park development, access to Hampton Court grounds or the cycle ban along Dukes Head Passage from High Street to Bushy Park, our members will give us their views.

For instance, they responded to our email newsletter that informed of the petition to overturn the cycle ban along Dukes Head Passage, requested by a Hampton resident. We provided a link to the petition but also asked for your opinions. We were pleased to see that there were a mixture, with many highlighting "how inconsiderate many cyclists can be" and "how they creep up silently and surprise pedestrians".

Hampton residents have indicated their continuing interest in the local environment: exactly the Society's aim.

Of course, new members mean more influence, and with 96 of them joining us since last May, we now approach the 600 household mark. That's a hefty total for a local non-political organisation whose sole purpose is to protect and improve the local environment for its population. Sunbury's residents know we support them in their Keep Kempton Green campaign to prevent an unsuitable development which would add even more traffic on to the already crowded Upper Sunbury Road.

We understand the Jockey Club wishes to concentrate on Sandown Park, sacrificing Kempton to finance an all-weather course at Newmarket. Sandown is on a slope – unlike Kempton's flat gravel – some reckoned it to be unsuited to racing on the flat. The famous Boxing Day King George V Cup just wouldn't be the same anywhere other than Kempton. *continued on page 3*

Our MP, Dr Tania Mathias, joined us for the lunch at Merits training restaurant in January. She was very impressed that the views we express are backed up by many of our residents. The use of polling your opinions in our email and printed newsletters means we can illustrate the scope of feeling behind particular issues.

On that note, Dr Mathias also encouraged us to fill in the various Government Heathrow surveys, saying "if they are not filled in, the developers will think that people of this area don't have an opinion". I know that we do and although the Night Flights public consultation closed at the end of February, those for Airspace and Heathrow Expansion go on until 25 May so please go to www.tania4twickenham.co.uk/news/heathrow-consultations for links to find out how to make your views known.

Finally, the *Nominate Pavements for Repair* scheme is running. As the condition of your pavements was a leading concern in the village survey, it's your chance to encourage your neighbours to get together and propose the area of paving that affects you. The stronger the response, the greater the chance of repair. It's a shame that it should have to come to this but the council is limited in funds and time to repair so this helps move areas up the priority list. There have already been successful applications in Church Street, High Street and Station Road.

Obituary

Hampton Football Club's Alan Simpson

The recent passing of comedy scriptwriter Alan Simpson, although international news, was also personal to a corner of Hampton. Alan was an integral part of Hampton & Richmond Borough F.C. for almost 50 years and a massive presence in Beveree Stadium.

Alan found the club quite by accident. Back in 1966, on finding himself insufficient time to get to Craven Cottage to watch Fulham, he decided to wander into Beveree to see Hampton FC (as it then was) take on Huntley & Palmer's in the Spartan League. The following year he happily accepted the post of club president, a position he held to the end of his life.

To the world he was the co-writer of *Hancock's Half-Hour*, *Hancock* and *Stephoe & Son* with long-standing partner Ray Galton. To everyone at the club he was just Alan. He loved his football and would gladly talk about the last game or about a certain player, rather than his comedy writing.

Many were the ways in which he helped the club. He loved to sponsor a player each season, usually a goalkeeper because he had always wanted to be one in his youth.

It became an established part of my pre-match routine to give him his teamsheet and have a chat about a new player or recent action concerning his beloved Hampton FC. His presence – so much part of the club for so long – will never leave Beveree, such is the love and respect the fans had for the man, our Alan.
