ITwon't have escaped many residents' notice that Hampton village's roads have been thrown into disarray these past few weeks.

As night fell on the first Friday of half-term, with no written warning from the council, new double yellow lines were painted on High Street, unsuspecting cars towed away to the far end of Ormond Avenue and a new system of traffic flow implemented around the Triangle at the junction with Church Street.

Luckily, local councillors were quick to circulate a letter explaining the situation: the temporary closure of the A308 while Thames Water repaired leaks. Fair enough. However, residents around the Triangle were subjected to swearing drivers, horns blasting day and night, several car accidents (and as many near-misses), not to mention the increased danger to the lives of pedestrians as angry drivers flung themselves out into oncoming traffic and attempted to cut corners to beat the queues. And all this while roadworks were in full swing on Station Road! To top it all, after an accident on the A308 a few days later, traffic was diverted via Plevna, Varna and Avenue Roads causing further chaos.

Let this carry a message to those involved in the proposed housing development at Kempton Park (as reported in our March 2014 issue). They imagine they can accommodate thousands more cars on the A308 by permanently altering the flow of traffic around Hampton's Triangle. If the experience of this “dummy run” is anything to go by, their proposals are not viable!

P.S. A ray of hope that emerges from all the disruption on High Street is that the council did listen to residents' complaints and quickly implemented some of their suggestions, resulting in improved safety and traffic flow for the duration of the works. *

Any Questions? comes to Hampton

The spotlight will be on Hampton's White House on 19 December – and not just because it's Christmas. The Community Association there is hosting BBC Radio 4's popular live audience-participation programme that night. But they've waited three years for it.

As far as anyone can remember, it was about ten years ago when the venerable *Any Questions?* last favoured us with a visit, Hampton School on that occasion. So we were due for another one. Accordingly, some time in the autumn of 2011 the White House put in its application, spurred on by the suggestion of Judy Morrison, stalwart member of the Middlesex Yeomanry Band, which is based there. Out of the blue last September the BBC replied: was the White House still interested? Guess the rest.



The main hall there can seat 220 people. At the time of writing 60 seats are spoken for, all free of charge, as is customary for the BBC. Naturally, local organisations have been invited to book, and individuals can apply by ringing the White House office on **020 8979 2600** between 10am and 4pm or you can leave a message. But be quick – and if you do get a seat, remember to be in it by 7.15pm, almost an hour before the broadcast starts.

Note: No-one can tell you who the four panellists will be. As regular listeners know announcements are made only a week in advance, at the end of the previous week's broadcast. At least they will be offered the services of a green room behind the stage – a benefit not always provided by other hosts. *

Unauthorised street art blights Hampton's streets

Unusually multi-coloured markings recently appeared on the roads and pavements around the Hampton Triangle, "graffitied" by contractors in high visibility vests who, when challenged, claimed that Richmond Council knew all about it.

In an exchange of emails, local residents, the Hampton Society and councillors expressed their concerns to representatives at Richmond Council, only to discover that they were as much in the dark as everyone else.

Furthermore, the Council consider that an offence has been committed "in direct contravention of Section 132 of the Highways Act 1980" and have threatened legal proceedings (although it has to be said that the penalty for first offenders is only £100). An outraged local councillor said: "It is an absolute disgrace that your company can simply come into our streets and graffiti the length and breadth of the pavements and carriageways without first seeking any permission from the local authority or offering any form of explanation."

It appears the marks were part of a cable and utilities survey done at the behest of Redrow Homes, according to the staff of Select Surveys, who spray-painted them on 3 October. Select Surveys were working for TriConnex, who were in turn working for Aspire (the Jockey Club's lead consultant on the 1500-homes-plus-commercial-units development proposed for Kempton Park). Redrow Homes were recently granted the right of first refusal over 70 acres of land on the Kempton Park estate. Mouchel, who were conducting a traffic count on the same day, are the Jockey Club's transport consultants for the same development.



Despite being asked several times, TriConnex have been reluctant to explain the purpose of the survey work. "Everyone I have spoken with has been vague to the point of evasiveness," said a Council officer. Despite the reticence of TriConnex and Aspire, however, the PR consultant to the Jockey Club confirmed today that the work was connected with the Kempton Park proposal.

There are similar markings on the road and pavement at the racecourse, and also near the roundabout at Hampton Court Bridge, including on the cobblestones at the entrance to the Palace itself. TriConnex have agreed to remove the paint from the Hampton Triangle and a member of the Select Survey team was spotted in the area last Sunday, brandishing a clipboard. However, at time of going to press, the markings remain. *

Record Remembrance Sunday

Maybe it was the centenary of WWI, intensified by all those ceramic poppies at the Tower of London, but Hampton produced a record turnout for 2014's Remembrance Sunday parade and service. As in previous years, representatives of local organisations paraded from the Methodist church in Percy Road to our simple war memorial in Oldfield Road.

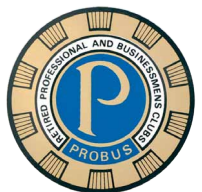

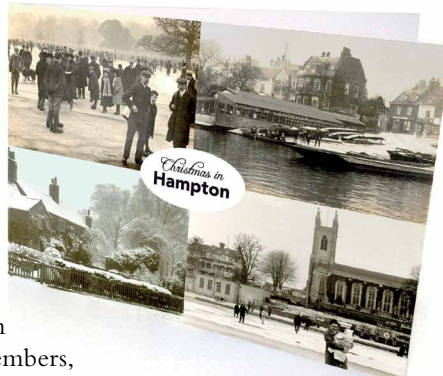

Christmas starts early in Hampton this year

CHRISTMAS IN HAMPTON starts on Sunday 30 November, the date of Father Christmas's fifth annual sleigh-ride around the streets surrounding our station. Organised as usual by our Hampton Village Traders Association, an innovation this year will be three grottoes in the Sea Scout hall, two for Father Christmas and one for Mother Christmas.



Following the enormous successes of previous years, the grottoes in the Station Road hall are designed to cut down on queuing – and childish nerves. Grotto organiser Susan Green of Greenacres Nurseries believes some children may feel more confident to meet Mother Christmas, especially if this is their first time. So she is providing eight elves, *Peppa Pig* and *Upsy Daisy* characters to marshal the queues and keep them entertained while they wait their turn.

As for the adults, sound-alikes *Elvis* and *Amy Winehouse* will perform on the stage at Hampton Green after the local school choirs and the Wensleydale band have done their turns with Christmas carols and other yuletide music. Not to be outdone, *Roy Orbison* and *Cher* are due to strut their stuff on the other side of the railway bridge outside Hampton Cellar during the second half.

To cater for all this jollity Station, Ashley and (part of) Gloucester roads will be closed to traffic between 4.00 and 7.00pm to allow for free roaming between all the pavement stalls set up by the Traders, who have selected various good causes for donations instead of their usual payments.

Everything kicks off at 4.00pm when the Christmas tree outside the Sea Scout hall is lit, swiftly followed by all the smaller trees above the shop fronts all along the parade route. Then the fun can begin: Father Christmas's sleigh will wind its way around all the aforementioned roads before entering Station Road again for his final destination at the hall.

People might want to delay Sunday dinner once they know about all the food and drink on offer. Shopkeepers will be offering sausages in buns, hamburgers, chips, hot chestnuts, sweets, mulled cider and fizzy drinks. After sampling that lot, maybe they'll cancel Sunday dinner!
