'Garden-grabbing' banned

ne of the first actions of the new Conservative-Liberal Democrat coalition government was to stop property developers 'grabbing' what seemed like any potential building sites - to them - and back gardens - to us.

Hampton has long suffered from such in-filling, much to the distress of local residents and councillors alike. Geoffrey Samuel, our longtime representative for Hampton North and now deputy leader of the newly-elected Richmond Borough Council, is delighted at the policy change. He tells us "We went on record several years ago urging just this change. We are totally committed to preserving the unique character of various parts of this borough and this new approach will make our task the easier. In-filling has blighted some lovely parts of Richmond-Upon-Thames and we are extremely pleased that we now have a weapon with which to combat it"

Our newly-elected LibDem councillors Ellen Day and Darren Thornton agree. Ellen says both of them "have lived in the community long enough to understand the need to maintain and protect the character and environment of Hampton even among inevitable change." She continues, "this in itself is one of the main reasons we stood as councillors, and with the help of local residents and fellow councillors we as a community work to maintain the beauty and wonders that survive."

Until now gardens of private houses were regarded as brownfield sites: land that had already been built on, so making it difficult for councils to refuse

developments. Garden-grabbing has already affected more than 40% of councils, many of them, unsurprisingly, concentrated in the South East of England. Now it has to stop!





Happy 25th Birthday Hampton Pool

ampton Pool was saved from closure and reopened by a group of local residents 25 years ago. It is an incredible success story of how determination and local support can achieve what might seem impossible. From a more than modest re-birth, the heated open air pool is today a million pound business and a fabulous asset right on our doorsteps.

Marshall Lees (pictured above), one of the original campaigners, spoke on Friday night at a celebration party attended by the Right Hon. Vincent Cable MP, the Mayor and Mayoress, members of the Hampton Pool Trust board, local councillors and supporters and contributors from the last 25 years. He concluded his speech by reminding us all that it was the support of the community as a whole through campaigning and fundraising that made the dream a reality for us all to enjoy.

General Roy monument, Roy Grove, off Hanworth Road, Hampton

Did you know that Hampton played a significant part in the development of accurate map making? Major General William Roy conceived the idea of using triangulation to produce a map of the whole country, thus laying the foundations for the Ordnance Survey. The up-ended cannon in the corner of Roy Grove represents the one that was used originally as a marker and was erected in 1926 to commemorate the 200th anniversary.

It is the south-eastern end of the very first base-line for the Ordnance Survey, which was at the time part of Hounslow Heath. The other end is marked by a similar monument on the north side of Heathrow Airport.

The area was chosen because at the time it was flat and unobstructed, allowing a long, straight baseline to be measured. This was done using accurately measured rods which were used like a huge pair of rulers to measure the length of the line. Modern surveys have shown that this was just a couple of inches out – a remarkable achievement. It is recalled in the street names - Cannon Close and Roy Grove.

Notes from the Chairman

The annual general meeting of the Society was held on 15 April 2010 and details of the newly elected officers and committee are listed opposite. Colin Sinnott was an exemplary Treasurer, performing his arcane labours with accuracy and unfailing patience. Bryan Alderson, the longest serving of those who have retired, has simply been a tower of strength (literally so when it came to moving tables and chairs at meetings) for many years. We shall miss them all and hope to keep in touch with them.

We have started allotting tasks to the committee members and the process will continue. Alice Fordham, Rosemary Hill and Maura Waters will arrange visits and talks. Sam Redfern and John Wood are looking after membership, Maura Waters has taken over as newsletter editor, with support from William Redfern, and Tony Marks will keep an eye on planning issues, where he will co-operate with our friends at Hampton Hill Association.

We were given clear guidance at the AGM that we should maintain an effective dialogue with our neighbours in Hampton Hill and we shall of course do so. I have already had talks with Mike Walker, HHA Chairman, and we shall continue to consider how and to

what extent we can share our activities.

When appropriate we shall also see whether it is feasible to make use of the excellent facilities at the White House.

Another important issue that was helpfully raised at the AGM was the size of our membership, which has declined in recent years and is smaller than could reasonably be expected for a community like Hampton. We shall do what we

can to improve our publicity and make clear the attractions of joining and supporting the Society. We hope our members will do their best to bring our existence and activities to the notice of their friends and neighbours.

As well as losing a number of committee colleagues this year, we have also had to replace some long-standing newsletter deliverers who have retired after a long period of valuable service. We are grateful to them for helping us to keep in touch with our members. We very much appreciate the offers of help we have had with the job of delivering the newsletters and will take up these welcome offers in due course.

As well as having new committee members and new deliverers we have also taken note of the fact that political control of the Council (as well as the Government) has changed. We are of course non-party-political although many of our activities inevitably have a political element – planning, transport, traffic, Heathrow and so forth. We shall as always be glad to work with the Council and with our local Councillors, of whatever persuasion, but shall not hesitate to oppose them when it is in the best interests of the residents of Hampton to do so.

I send best wishes for the summer to all our members and look forward to seeing you at our events.

Be one of the first to see Walpole's restored masterpiece

ampton Society members will be among the first to visit Horace Walpole's Georgian gothic house in the opening month of September.

Walpole's choice of architecture came to be known as 'Strawberry Gothic' and was much imitated during the eighteenth century. Even today upper-crust garden designers copy its pointed arch windows and ivycovered walls. Its round tower, crenellated rooftops and intricate chimney-pots show its owner's obsession with fashionable architecture and style.

Indeed, Walpole formed his own Committee of Taste

together with John Chute, responsible for the main elevations of the house and its interiors, and the artist and draughtsman John Bentley. They created the desirable residence befitting the high position in society now enjoyed by the son of England's first prime minister. In fact, from its origins as a modest coachman's house built in 1698, Walpole extended his property from five acres to 46.

Now all that remains of Horace Walpole's treasures is his collection of painted and stained glass, whose fragile state has earned Strawberry Hill a place in the World Monuments Fund Watch list of 100 most endangered sites.
