here do the 2012 Olympic Games really start? Fingers crossed there are – unconfirmed – plans to sail the Olympic torch downriver by barge from Hampton Court on its final relay to the stadium in Stratford, East London. Once there, the formal opening of the Games is signalled, as always, by the lighting of the Olympic flame. The last big public sighting of it, remember, was at Beijing.

The Palace will also feature in two off-track cycling events. On 28 and 29 July the road races will take competitors through Richmond Park, Twickenham, Teddington, Bushy Park and past Hampton Court Palace, with time trials due to start and finish there on August 1. After that, a medal ceremony is scheduled to take place. Inevitably some local roads will be closed for twelve hours from 4am for this event.

I'm sure some of us will view this as a once-in-a-lifetime chance to catch a glimpse – albeit fleeting – of the Olympic events and competitors. Others may even now be rushing to book holidays or otherwise ensure they are far from Hampton during these weeks!

ne comes, one goes. What are we to make of Richmond Council's decision to develop Tangley Square (or Sainsbury's, Tangley Park area) while closing Tangley Hall, our local day centre for dementia sufferers?



According to deputy council leader Geoffrey Samuel, who represents Hampton North Ward, the development is just what the area needs. We've lost the Post Office, a bakers, a dry cleaners and a greengrocers as well as chiropody services for the elderly. Plans for a £1m+ children's centre were also dropped.

Now a family-orientated children's centre is due to open in the precinct before Christmas. Says Cllr Samuel, "The council reached agreement

in principle to develop the square but it's a five to ten-year plan needing a feasibility study during the summer, a public consultation and then a planning brief to see who's interested. But we'll have a slimmed-down children's centre before Christmas."

As for closing Tangley Hall, only three of the fifty dementia sufferers attending it actually came from Hampton, he says. To which Lib Dem Cllr Darren Thornton (also Hampton North) positively fumes. "There were seven people from Hampton, five from Teddington and twelve from Whitton using Tangley Hall. Cllr Samuel is just going on the transport figures and not looking at the attendance as a whole." Cllr Thornton says 41 people attended as of last November, 27 of whom lived within a two-mile radius of Hampton.

Cllr Samuel concedes there were 49 people on the Centre's waiting list 18 months ago, now there are none. He claims people are making choices as to how they spend the money they receive from the Council as "self-directed support" and that could mean attending a British Legion club, visiting relatives or attending college courses, for instance.

Besides, he says, with recent strides in treatment for dementia our local centre was too small to be fit for purpose. But one of the most useful therapies is that of smell and the sensory garden planned for the Ham Centre can provide this. Cllr Samuel claims Ham is also closer to home for the majority of former Tangley attenders, some of whom travelled from Putney and Barnes for instance.

Finally, Cllr Thornton is suspicious of the "relatively small" amount of money our Tory council has set aside to develop Tangley Square. "There's just over £5m to be divided between five "uplift" areas in the Borough, only £400,000 marked for Tangley," he says.

The Middlesex Yeomanry Band



The sound fairly blows the roof off the White House's main hall. It's the Middlesex Yeomanry's Christmas concert, and with 35 instrumentalists in full swing – including three tuba players – it's only what you'd expect.

But back in 1962, the band's future was bleak. It was axed as a casualty of the reorganisation of our reserve forces after performing a communications role as part of the Middlesex Yeomanry TA Regiment.

At this juncture, a former Commanding Officer of the Regiment, the late Lt. Col. Bill Williams, rode to the rescue, negotiating with the MoD to take over all the assets of the band and keep it as a uniformed – albeit civilian – one. For many years, right up until his death, he poured a great deal of his own money into the band to keep it going.

In 1999, after the colonel's death, and homeless when the MoD sold off its TA drill halls, White House chairman, the late Maureen Woodriff, now stepped in. Bandsman Ron Keevil, a former warrant officer, explained: "Maureen jumped at the chance to give us a home and we were more than grateful. She offered us storage space for all our sheet music as well as our music stands and the big bass drum emblazoned with the regiment's battle honours." (cont. p4)

Royal Oak plaque Oak Avenue, Hampton

On the night of November 7, 1940, eight high-explosive bombs hit Hampton. Among the six civilians killed in that incident were local residents William Adams and Sidney Till. Both men were standing outside the Royal Oak pub in Oak Avenue. Now a plaque commemorating the event has been placed on the pub's outside wall. It bears the message "Why should we forget?"

Home Park gateway improvements

(cont. from page 2) The Middlesex Yeomanry Band was formed as early as 1843 and has become the proud possessor of a very valuable archive of military music inherited from many regimental bands that are now defunct. With typical military efficiency, each band stamped its identity on its own sheet music, resulting in a fascinating record of long lost regiments, some of them of Irish origin disbanded in 1921 before Partition. Says Ron, "We have about 3,500 scores – arrangements for the seated band and about 300 marches printed on cards for a marching band. Some of them go back to the 19th Century."



From the original dozen homeless players of the 1990s, the Middlesex Yeomanry Concert Band's current 35 members include eight former military bandsmen. Rehearsals take place on Sunday mornings at the White House and performances are both there and at the Musical Museum in Brentford and at the Star and Garter in Richmond – an in-home event for former servicemen. Hampton's annual carnival is also given a rousing welcome by the band performing at its starting point in Nursery Green.

Ron reckons the band has encouraged a swing band from Hounslow to use the White House as a base and a saxophone quartet has followed suit. "What with two choirs, art and ballet classes and ourselves, the White House must be the most varied Performing Arts Centre in the Borough," he says.

Now he'd just like to hear from a few more brass players to swell the band's numbers. For the record, members are of all ages and nearly half of them are women. They all wear a smart dark green and black uniform – original colours the MoD allowed them to retain.

Since the Yeomanry ceased to be a marching band and became an established concert one, we can now sing all the verses of their signature tune "The Lass of Richmond Hill" without fear of losing the tune as they march away!
