When local roads are closed to traffic for your event, you know you've arrived. This is the third year Hampton village's traders are organising our Christmas festivities, but the first where people can wander between the stalls on the route of Santa's sleigh, traffic-free.

On Sunday, 2 December, Station Road, on one side of the railway line and Ashley Road on the other will be alive with lighted stalls, Christmas trees and fairy lights.

Everything will start at 4.00pm at the Scout hut in Station Road, when Richmond Mayor Cllr. Rita Palmer and MP Vince Cable will perform the opening ceremony. Along the route of Santa's sleigh, businesses will have hot sausages, chestnuts, sweets and candy floss on offer to keep out the cold.

Choirs from Denmead School, Hampton Junior School and Hampton Infants School will be singing carols in a marquee on Hampton Green, Station Road. Hampton Choral Society plan to do their carolling at various points along the route.

Once again Teddington & Hampton Rotary Club will lend its sleigh to carry Santa along the route, up Station Road, over the railway bridge into Ashley Road, to turn right towards the junction with Gloucester Road, and then back towards Station Approach and on to the level crossing. Then it's back down Station Road to a carpeted Scout hut ready to welcome Santa to his grotto there. Each child he sees will be given a bag of chocolate coins, courtesy of Sainsbury's, who are also raffling a television set. *Continued on back page*...

Local artist's work at Orleans House Gallery



GARRICKS Temple of Shakespeare & Church at Hampton 1769

When Orleans House Gallery opened to the public in 1972 Hampton's Joan Heath was there. Forty years later she was there again, helping to celebrate the milestone birthday by highlighting one work from their collection. Her choice was Eric Fraser's line drawing "Garrick's Temple to Shakespeare and Church at Hampton".

The artist lived in Hampton, at Penn's Cottage in Church Street, until he died in 1983. Prolific and well respected in his field, many of Eric Fraser's works grace the interior of St Mary's Church, but he is best known for Mr. Therm, the logo used nationwide by the gas industry in the 1940s and 50s.

The Twickenham gallery's current exhibition, The Big 40 Times, consists of 40 pieces of art from their collection selected by 40 of their supporters, one work for each year. As a participant and volunteer for all of those years, Joan was given the honour of featuring on the first page of the exhibition programme. In it she describes Eric Fraser as "a modest, shy man, rather humorous. We all knew each other in Hampton back then".

Now aged 94, Joan is still actively involved in the Borough's cultural events – including our own Society of course – and is part of the volunteers' team at Garrick's Temple. **MW**

Hampton's success with floral displays continues

Denmead school update

Denmead Neighbours' Association (DNA) understand that Denmead School's planning application to redevelop their Gloucester Road site, filed last December, is due to come before the Planning Committee. Local residents filed over 150 objections including: intensified traffic problems, increased noise and disturbance, loss of open land and opening up a cul-de-sac for access. The DNA, which represents local residents, has launched a website to set out their views on the application in an accessible format with downloadable photos, maps and documents along with details of relevant planning policies:

Prue Leith Hampton talk

If parents are never taught to cook, how can their children be blamed for eating junk food? Prue Leith proposed the question to a capacity audience at Hampton Library recently when she spoke about her varied life as a restaurateur, TV cookery judge and top-level businesswoman.

"I'm a busy woman, I always want to fix things, mostly teaching children to cook" she explained. She thinks the Tories believe people should be responsible for their own lives, "but people need to be educated about food".

As her

contribution to Richmond's Literary Festival, this was Prue's first visit to Hampton. Was she impressed? Certainly. On



asking her way to the library from the station she was quite taken aback when the two locals questioned replied that of course they could direct her, and did so unerringly. (Of course we residents know perfectly well it's at the bottom of Rosehill, where you least expect it!)

Born in South Africa, Prue first appreciated food at a higher level when she worked as an au pair in France. Later, in England she did a cookery course and started her own catering company from a tiny flat in Paddington. The business side of catering attracted her, and it wasn't too long before she found herself the token woman on important boards like British Rail, Safeway, Royal Bank of Scotland and Orient Express. The fact that the first three possessed chequered histories was no reflection upon her role as their catering adviser, though.

Like many celebrities, Prue has her London taxi-driver story. "Aren't you that cook off the telly?" asked one. "Tell you something, that Norwich City's rubbish!"

This October saw Hampton celebrating not only the first anniversary of the local Women's Institute but also that of MTV youth, a Friday evening drop in club for 8-14 year olds at the Oldfield Centre, Hampton.

The club has been going from strength to strength and now has over 120 youths on its books and a highly dedicated team of 20 local volunteers. Since the club began, Hampton has seen a 67% drop in anti-social behaviour and local youths now interact more positively with the local police.

Just as we believe the Hampton Society facilitates a channel of communication within the community and brings people together, it is clear that the ethos of other local voluntary organisations, which target specific sectors of the community, are in line with our own: "to ensure that the provision of amenities enhances the quality of life for the residents of Hampton".
